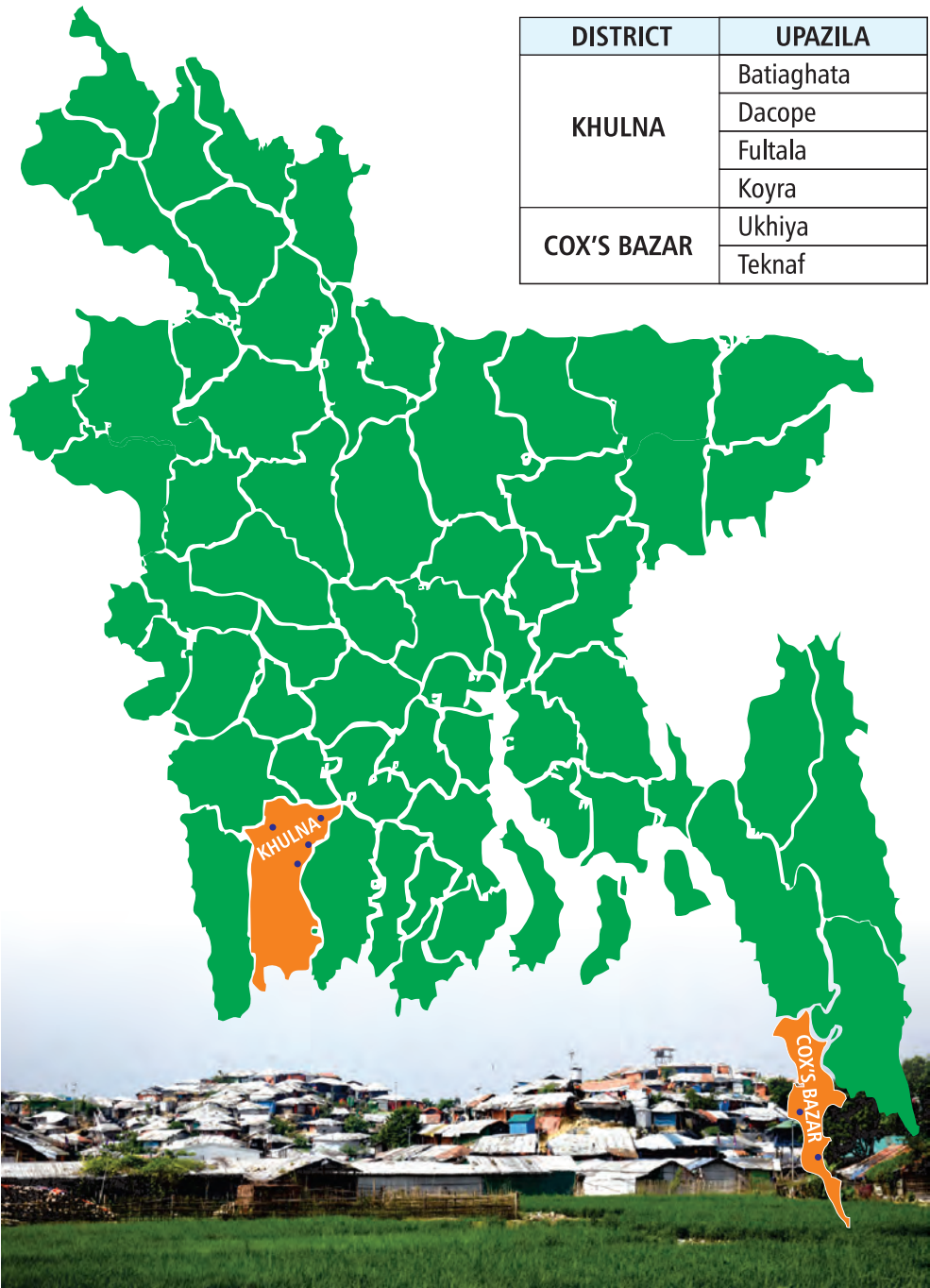
Executive Committee

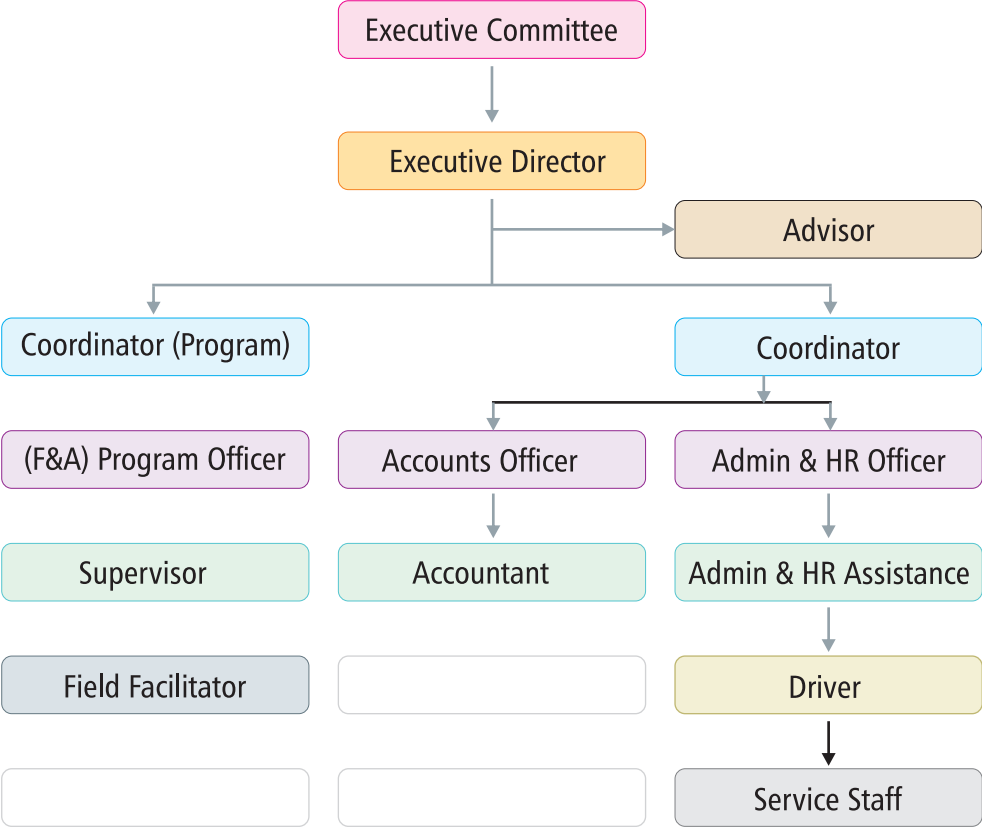

Engagement of Youth for Employment and Enterprise (EYEE)

Youth unemployment issue is essential for sustainable development of Bangladesh. The youth unemployment has increased significantly over the years whereas the overall unemployment remained stable. The annual rise in population is increasing the share of the working-age population, as a mass of new employees joining the workforce of the country. The BBS reported that, in 2016, the youth population in Bangladesh has been about 52 million which is more than 33 percent of the total population. Over the next 10 years, the working-age population structure has been expected to grow more than 2.2 million annually. As the employment is falling with a simultaneous slow response on job creation, it would be an issue for the Bangladeshi policy makers. Similarly, global youth unemployment is in the more critical situation than the overall unemployment. ILO reported that one-third of the young people, 1.8 billion, were not involved in employment, education or training. It is expected that around one billion youth would enter the job market and only 40 percent of them would be able to get jobs in the next decade.

1. Develop youth club to uphold collective youth voice
2. Skill building through technical and vocational education and training (TVET)
3. Partnership with private agent bank/financial institute for access to business capital
4. Youth friendly information centre to scale up business

- **Youth clubs** in the project areas where youth volunteer (age between18-35) united as member among them 47% are girl. Youth clubs are oriented by Upazilla youth development officer and in the process of registration from Department of youth development.
- Increase youth **knowledge and Soft skill** of youth through training on voluntarism and leadership development, Life skill development.
- **Vocational training** on mobile phone repairing, house wearing, car driving, solar technology, zero grazing animal rearing and horticulture through greenhouse shed.
- The trained youth get **support and facilitation** to establish enterprise and/or job

Economic Development of youth especially woman

Bangladesh is performing well in poverty alleviation where the working age segment is 49.9% (age 18-35 yr.) of total population. It's indicates a very potential future for this country if this segment is properly employed. This project is taking the steps to increase the skills of rural youth and create employment opportunities in the rural areas of Bangladesh. The aim of this project is to set an example of successful youth employment and reduce migration from rural to urban areas. The project is focused to provide Technical Vocational Education and Training (TEVT) and ensure employment of 10,000 rural marginal youth that will support to achieve the overall goal of employability and entrepreneurship signature programme of Bangladesh e.g. increase socio-economic inclusion and income of youth through meaningful, decent employment.



Target groups

Poor and marginalized people, particularly women, adolescent girls and unemployed youth of chadpai union parisad under mongla upazilla that 6 kilometer naval distance from Sunderban, two kilometre from mongla port two kilonmeter from Pasur river and mongla UNO office. Currently, working with 358 women crab farmers.

Overall goal of the projec

To increase productivity, income and access to services for marginalize and poor families in the targeted areas.



Objective:

- To increase income generating opportunities and empowerment of the under privileged women farmers.
- To increase farmers access to environmental friendly technologies.
- To increase access to local government service providing agencies, particularly in the areas of primary health care, fisheries, water, sanitation and social safety net
- To increase women participation in the village economy, and decision-making processes of cooperative management.

Farmers-led
Agricultural Development
Project

In order to increase the organic agricultural development and skill development in the Batiaghata upazila of Khulna, 50 farmers have been received agricultural training. Farmers are playing an important role in the production of agriculture through sharing their expertise and experience of each other by financial support donor agency MISEREOR, Germany's. In 2016, the training held in the LoCOS Conservative Assembly in November 2016 is given in the preparation of seedbed, planting and seedling, fertilizer application, techniques for the preparation of organic insecticides and the techniques and use of worm compost making techniques. Farmers participating in organic farming are engaged in organic farming and poisoning and also playing role in vegetables production.

Case Study

Increasing capacity of 50 farmers in native Agricultural development And 2505 women in the face of disaster risk reduction



In the Khulna district of Phultala and Koyra upazila, 2505 rural poor people were provided with food assistance as well as training to reduce the risk of disaster including various training for their livelihood. LoCOS also provide this training as an implementing organization under the scheme Vulnerable Group Development (VGD) of Women's Development Program, organized by the Women Affairs Department, Ministry of Women and Child Affairs, Government of Bangladesh. After receiving these training, the poor women are working in the disaster risk reduction and mitigation by creating awareness by themselves and taken decision on disaster preparedness in coastal disaster-prone area, before the cyclone and the storm, during pre-disaster, ongoing disaster and post disaster. Because of their disaster, they are decreasing the amount of damage due to disaster. In addition to providing food support to the distressed families in the work area and to increase their skills, encouraged them to collect the initial capital of the investment through savings, earning opportunity by obtaining loan, enhancing efficiency of human development, and contributing to the positive change of their views through the active participation of poor women. The women mentioned above that have changed.

Up scaling Managed Aquifer Recharge (MAR) for Providing Community Water Supply in Saline Areas

About 09 thousand people benefited from drinking safe drinking water from 23 MAR Site conducted by LoCOS in Dacop and Batiaghata upazilas this year. Technical assistance of Geology Department of Dhaka University and with the financial support of UNICEF, the community people of the coastal region have been benefited from the year 2010. The project has been implemented by the name Up Sealing Managed Aquifer Recharge for Providing Community Water Supply in Saline Areas. The University of Dhaka is a unique method of research in the context of the coastal region of Bangladesh. The pond or roof rain water is filtered by artificial means and inserted into the water layer under the soil through a large pipe. Due to the involvement of rain water, it is useful to reduce the salinity of water. Each plant has regular checks for EC, PH, Temperature, Turbidity, Arsenic, and Iron.

If the site is suitable for drinking water through these tests, the site is handed over to the community. Site management committee consists of 5 members in each site with president, secretary, cashier, and two working members. Based on the discussion of the committees and the water users, one site care taker and technical supervisor learn from the site management tasks. Every day, the abstraction meter readings keep records of the documents given by Dhaka University. If there is any problem with the management of the site, the care taker notifies the committee. The committee and the water users will discuss the problem solving problems.

Each month the beneficiaries submit to the monthly subscribe to the cashier. Sitewise monthly expenditure and accounts report has discussed in the monthly meeting and Cashier explain it to all the members. Every site discusses the overall theme of the plant through the monthly coordination meeting with the Technical Supervisor Committee and enhances the awareness of the committee including the Committee on Site Management and Maintenance through Philipp Chart/ Posters. Apart from this, 4712 students of 23 educational institutions in the work area have been provided with practical training in sanitation management and safe drinking water through school sessions

Support for forcefully displaced Myanmar national

LoCOS has distributed street lights into the camps (please mention which camp) for the security purpose. The facility is still available and near about 200 households are having security to move outside during the evening. This has contributed to the girls and woman to come out during dark even for using toilet it was almost impossible for them to go out due to security concern. This also have facilitated children and their care giver as well.

On the other hand, as these community lighting facility have reduced the illegal intervention inside the camp settlements. As these light are solar power generated so it reduce the environmental hazard as well.



Household level solar light distribution :

Give a photoFor household level lighting LoCOS has distributed 5000 solar charging moveable lamps which have facilitated the Rohingya people to do their households works even the sunset. The children are able to do their study and other members especially the woman are able to additional work seating at their households. Beside that the house there were no meal members this lights has facilitated their security during nights.
